Paul Kawczak

A complex and subtle exploration of how refined barbarism can really be.

One morning in September 1890, a Belgian surveyor under orders from his King to divide Africa, sets off from Léopoldville toward the north. Guided only by the stars and a few rudimentary instruments, Pierre Claes finds himself heading deep into the wild lands on a mission to draw an accurate picture of what the European authorities were calling "progress". He boards the Fleur de Bruges and travels up the River Congo, accompanied by Bantu workers and a Chinese master tattoo artist by the name of Xi Xiao, who is also a former executioner skilled in the macabre art of human cutting. Xi Xiao detects the future in all things, he can see the horrors colonization will bring, and he knows he will love the Belgian surveyor with all his heart. Darkness is a story of human and geographic dismemberment.

Magic realism meanders throughout this remarkable adventure novel, imbuing the narrative with an undercurrent of forbidden love and all the passion and pain of opera. As it carries readers on a moving journey from Northern Europe to the heart of Africa, the story rolls like a tear of blood down the face of History as we know it.

After Le Fil des kilomètres, Christian Guay-Poliquin comes back with a dark and hypnotic thriller of a cold and dramatic beauty.

Just outside a small village, two men — Matthias and an injured young man who has been entrusted to his care — find themselves together in the sun lounge of a formerly grand but now abandoned house with no electricity supply. Their agreement is that the old man will nurse the younger man back to recovery in exchange for firewood, food and, most of all, for a place in the convoy which will depart for the town the following spring.

As the snow grows ever deeper around them, each day brings with it its own assortment of challenges. Huddled by the wood burner, these two individuals laboriously develop a mutual understanding through their conversations and the visits of Joseph, Jonas, Jean, Jude, José and the beautiful Maria. Rumours from the village permeate into their isolated environment, the winter weighs heavily on them and the tension is palpable. Will they be able to hold out?

Diane's body is slowly trying to adapt. She's been sleeping less, she's getting stronger and her endurance is astonishing. She was already a model employee and now she'll be able to exceed expectations at work all the more. And yet, these unexpected effects of her recent surgery are making her panic.


The space inside her head head feels like it is getting smaller. She can feel metal where her bones should be. Her senses are heightened: sight, smell, breath. What's most frightening is that all of her hair, head and body turned red overnight. And males are starting to follow her. What is behind this strange transformation? Fifteen years earlier, when she was a teenager, Diane spent a memorable summer on Isle-aux-Grues: Eugene braving the dangers of the raging ocean, his fascination for endangered species and the unforgettable night of the fire.

Akin to Marie Darrieussecq's *Pig Tales*, this novel is a neoliberal animal fable, intended for those who have lost their way.

They were right near Pointe-aux-Pins, the highest spot on the island, where it felt like you could stitch together both banks of the river if you spread your arms wide enough. Antoine Desjardins

This is a new form of literature about loss – the loss of the world as we know it. Antoine Desjardins' writing is unremitting, harsh and deeply beautiful, as if the words themselves had been reduced and purified by fire.

In the fiery frenzy of the 21st century, the relationship between human beings and the world has been thrown off balance. We watch, powerless, as the environment changes permanently. Antoine Desjardins explores our existential distress through seven compassionate fictional pieces. He questions our deep and troubled inner landscapes. How does the extinction of the black whale affect our love lives? What story do raindrops on a windowpane tell a teen strapped to a hospital bed? More importantly, how can we perpetuate hope and a sense of wonder to children raised in an environmental crisis? This work lovingly addresses these and many other questions with finesse and without being smug or overly moral.

Indice des feux paints the portrait of an uncertain future and reminds us the game is not yet over.

The room is empty. Not a person in sight. Nothing. Not my family, nor Francine, not the doctor, nor the machines, not the wardrobe, the tables or the couch. All gone. It is all under at least three feet of water that is still visibly rising. It's pouring in from everywhere – from holes in the walls, an open window, from the sink as it spills over onto the floor, from the ceiling... No. It's not coming from the ceiling anymore. I can see the sky, the clouds going by. Search me, but the walls are fucking gone. Vanished. So, I tiptoe off, like I'm levitating or I'm on a flying carpet or something. I'm floating. In my jacket in the middle of the smooth sea, as calm as a lake on a windless day, I drift on my makeshift mattress-raft.

V. just learned her mother's body was found washed up on the banks of the Saint Lawrence River in the Gaspésie, at the edge of the earth. She rushes back there, to her childhood home and builds an "island" for herself in the middle of the drafty living room. With the help of her grandmother's journals, it is a place designed to help her discover and erase the history of her family's female line...or bring it back. V. is completely absorbed in the journals and cannot stop reading. Her only escape is behind the counter at the local bar, topped with ethereal red hair and named Chloe.

The Cliffs is a tale about bringing order to chaos. It is a dreamlike journey, historical and feminine, bringing survivors together, mothers and daughters alike. From the Gaspésie to Iceland, they all have trouble staying put, choosing rather to be elsewhere and continually uprooting themselves.
