




Rodney Saint-Éloi


Marie-Anne Legault




Marie-France David



THE AMAZING LIFE OF PIERRE BOUCHER

Marvel at an abundant New France left to its own devices and revel in the burlesque theatre at the court of the greatest king of France. This is the incredible story of the founder of the city of Boucherville, part tall tale and part historical fiction.

At the King's Court, Pierre discovers an elite class swathed in glitz and glamour, a life of pomp a world away from life in New France—but he also stumbles upon a France plagued by poverty. Will this humble, worthy man find a way to save his country?

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


India Desjardins





THE BERLIN KID

Somewhere between investigative journalism and personal history, *The Berlin Kid* reads like an adventure novel. The author draws from unpublished documents, including Coulombe's own diary. She skilfully pieces together the apocalyptic night raids executed by the Kid and other airmen, without glossing over the hero's own violence.

July 1941. Twenty-year-old Roger Coulombe of Montmagny, Quebec, enlists in the Royal Canadian Air Force to go fight the Nazis in Europe. He would eventually become the only pilot in the Allied Forces to complete twelve raids on Berlin, earning him the nickname "Berlin Kid."

Hélène de Billy, whose father was a close friend of the Kid's, shines a spotlight on this fascinating character who earned a reputation for his death-defying raids aboard his Lancaster bomber during the Second World War.

"I liked flying, adventure, the unexpected," Coulombe would later write. Woven into the text are his memories of planes exploding in mid-air, his friends' seats empty at the breakfast table the following day, love stories abandoned in the wreckage, friendships that crumbled. And the haunting image of the German pilot's face glimpsed through the window of the Fokker in the midst of battle, shells whistling all around. A scene so vivid it's like being there.



Hélène de Billy

Quebecker Hélène de Billy grew up in Eeyou Istchee (James Bay) in a mining community with no access to fresh vegetables, flowers, or even television. At four, she won her first (and last) ski competition. At ten, she became a boarder at the School of the Ursulines. By twenty, she was working as a waitress in the dining room of the family motel. She left to

study political science at Memorial University of Newfoundland, then at the University of Manitoba and Université Laval. Journalist and editor-in-chief of three magazines, including enRoute by Air Canada (French section), she has been awarded some ten prizes and mentions and is a three-time recipient of the Prix Brascan. A writer, designer, and web project director, she wrote a TV program on art (Art sous enquête, about Quebec painters) and co-directed an interactive web documentary called Sacrée montagne for the National Film Board of Canada. *The Berlin Kid* is her eighth book.

AN INCORRUPTIBLE WOMAN

Christiane Ayotte came to lead one of the world's top laboratories in the field of illegal drug use in sports, accredited by the International Olympic Committee. But it wasn't an easy journey for a woman.

Like all women of her generation, Christiane Ayotte's career path was paved with obstacles. And yet, there was nothing ordinary about her journey. In fact, this fighter struggled to play her cards right in the almost exclusively male world of university-level chemistry. Once she finally landed a position as a research associate at the INRS-Santé laboratory, recognition and privileges were slow to follow-recognition that was considered the prerogative of her male colleagues.

Today, professor Ayotte is the director of that same laboratory and leads with integrity. Entire careers in sports live and die as a result of her analyses. This is the portrait of an incorruptible woman.

Christiane Ayotte regularly appears on public affairs programs for TV and radio, especially when they concern illegal drug use in sports. Ayotte is an expert who answers journalists with aplomb, who knows exactly what she is talking about and doesn't mince words.
